Keeping Us All Safe

While we are very excited to be back In-Person, we recognize that 2022's experience will be different from the past with the continued presence of COVID. A couple things to keep in mind: 1) keep your mask with you at all times; 2) we will REQUIRE masks in designated high density (crowded) areas that will be clearly marked by signs - at a minimum, that includes all stages, keynotes, and elevators; and 3) if you do feel ill during the Festival, we would suggest you consider using an at-home test and, if positive, stay put. Dogs/Pets - Wendy Cantrell

We want the National Women's Music Festival to be a safe and enjoyable experience for everyone. When bringing your pet to the festival, please remember that not everyone is a pet lover. Some people have a fear of dogs. We welcome our four legged friends and ask that everyone follows the policy. If any dog, including a service dog, exhibits behavior that is disruptive to others, such as barking, whining, jumping, urinating indoors or snapping, the owner is required to bring the dog under control immediately. This also goes for any other pet's behavior that may be considered disruptive to others. If your pet or service animal's behavior continues, the owner must remove the animal from the setting for the duration of the concert, workshop, meeting, etc. Service animals must also register. Chavela is the captivating look at the unconventional life of beloved performer Chavela Vargas, whose passionate renditions of Mexican popular music and triumphant return to the stage late in life brought her international fame. Born in Costa Rica in 1919, Chavela Vargas ran away to Mexico City as a teenager to sing in the streets. By the 1950s, she became a household name in her adopted country, delivering her performances with a raw passion and unique voice. Just as influential were her cultural contributions; Chavela was a bold, rebellious, sexual pioneer who was known for having many female lovers at a time when being out in Mexico was dangerous. Chavela centers around a 1991 interview - the singer's first public appearance after 15 hard years lost to alcoholism and heartbreak. In the final years of her life, Chavela openly comes out as a lesbian and rises into her momentous third act. becoming a muse to filmmaker Pedro Almodóvar, earning a Lifetime Achievement Grammy, and selling out performances at prestigious concert halls around the world. Both the festival (MichFest) and the song were born in 1976 - cultural products of a lesbian feminist movement

that had distinguished itself within and from the second wave feminist movement in the early 1970s. Maxine Feldman, who passed away in 2007, penned "Amazon" and sang it at the first festival. She, and others after her passing, continued to perform the song for the next 40 years. The lesbian of color political-cultural movement facilitated changes in the festival community such that its theme song would be altered from espousing primarily lesbian separatist values to revealing a new ethos of community building through coalition politics. This story is about women situated at the crossroads of mainstream social and political movements. Women whose art, culture, social activism, and political strategies have shaped and been shaped by more visible movements on the American landscape. It provides a glimpse into spaces where lesbians of color negotiate questions about community building, autonomy, and coalition

work, which inform our notions of civil society, citizenship, and social justice.







2022 Women in the Arts Awards

The Jane Schliessman Award for Outstanding Contributions to Women's Music

Jean Schliessman, a native of Racine, Wisconsin, attended the I.U. School of Law in Bloomington, IN. After graduation, she made Bloomington her home and worked as an attorney for the Legal Services Organization and in private practice. She specialized in women's issues and domestic relations. Her interests revolved around the arts and included creative writing and her love for women's music. She was involved in the first group of 13 women who revived the NWMF in Bloomington in 1982.

Jane was committed to peace and social change and spent time at the Seneca Women's Encampment for a Future of Peace and Justice (known as Peace Camp), even picnicking atop a buried nuclear warhead. Jane was 35 when she died in 1986 of colon cancer.

The Jane Schliessman Award is presented to Melanie DeMore for her life-long body of music, her workshops and willingness to share it all.

Life for Melanie DeMore is for the seeking and sharing of light, joy, and deep love for what moves you. If you haven't heard her yet, rest assured there is only one woman on this Planet who's voice is as deep, resonant, mesmerizing, comforting, and downright jaw-dropping in its power and sensuality as hers is. She has been a formidable presence onstage at such noted venues as Carnegie Hall, the Kennedy Center, and international folk music festivals from Europe to Cuba to New Zealand.

Most likely the words to a song of hers that has been performed by choirs and choruses all over the world and has given hope and comfort to so many... "I'm sending you light, to heal you, to hold you...I'm sending you light, to hold

vou in love."

The Jeanine C. Rae Award for the Advancement of Women's Culture

Jeanine C. Rae was a guiding light to many women's journeys during the women's movement in the 1970s and early '80s. An ordained minister, psychotherapist, political activist, and the mother of three children, Jeanine touched the lives of innumerable women throughout her short lifetime.

She was a co-founder and co-owner of The Women's Touch, Indianapolis' first women's bookstore and counseling center, in 1976. The Woman's Touch was the nucleus of a community that then created Woman Space newspaper, the first area hotline for women, feminist worship services, WomanShine Theatre, concert productions, and more. She was one of the midwives to the rebirth of NWMF during its move from Champaign, Illinois, to Bloomington. Her spirit continues to nurture the soul of this festival.

The Jeanine C. Rae Award is presented to Sarah Bush for her ongoing work in creating women's culture.



Artistic Director, Sarah Bush's devised dancetheater work has been commissioned by The Ground Floor at Berkeley Rep, Berkeley Art Center, Axis Dance

Company, Destiny Arts Center, and SF Movement Arts Festival at Grace Cathedral. Her work has been presented by A.C.T., Z Space, SF International Arts Festival, National Queer Arts Festival, Global Women's Rights Forum, National Women's Studies Association, West Wave Dance Festival, and at the Wilsey Center for Opera, Dance Mission Theater and Malonga Casquelourd Center for the Arts. Sarah has held residencies at Dos Rios, Berkeley Art Center, SAFEhouse for the Performing Arts, Richardson Bay Audubon, and Shotwell Studios. Sarah is the recipient of the 2019 Della Davidson Prize, a Dance Europe Critic's Choice selection, and awards from Curve Magazine and Bay Area Dance Watch.

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The Ruth Ann Rowan Believer Award

Ruth Rowan was a shero of National Women's Music Festival. She is remembered for her generous heart and enthusiasm. Ruth first attended NWMF in 1986, began serving as ASL interpreter in 1990, and was a board member from 2005 until her untimely death in 2016. She coordinated the interpreters and Marketplace. Ruth was a teacher of Deaf students and the sign language interpreter for Muse, Cincinnati Women's Choir. She was married for 30 years to her longtime love, Marsha. It was women's music and interpreting brought their daughter, Tammy, into Ruth and Marsha's lives. They all met at a Therese Edel concert where Ruth was interpreting in 1990. Tammy became a festival favorite, often interpreting onstage with her mom.

Ruth was dedicated to keeping NWMF thriving for years to come. Not only did she contribute money personally, she produced fund raisers to benefit NWMF. Marsha remembers Ruth at the festival, saying "Sometimes she was so tired she could not move and I would think 'Why is she working so hard?' Then I would see her on stage or in the merchant area talking to women, welcoming woman, and she was happily in her element. She loved this festival and did everything in her power to keep it going."

Ruth was a Believer!

The Ruth Rowan Believer Award is presented to Bettie Owen. Through her persistence, commitment, and BELIEF in possibilities, Bettie has grown the NWMF film series from a workshop strand into our very own NWMF mini-film festival.



For many years, **Bettie Owen** managed film projects for Wolfe Video, including supplying movies for the National

Women's Music Festival to screen. After years of a long distance connection with NWMF, she finally attended her first festival, and loved the experience. After that, she began volunteering for the festival.

In her past lives, Bettie has also volunteered as editor and writer of the lesbian publication *ENTRE NOUS*, and served as program director of the Billy

DeFrank LGBTQ+ Community Center. Today, Bettie volunteers as Board President of the Rainbow Chamber of Commerce Silicon Valley.

Besides volunteering, Bettie plays ukulele, participates in a book club, exercises at Silver Sneakers online classes, writes recreational fiction, enjoys her dogs, and hangs out with her wonderful friends. In the last 4 years, Bettie and her wife Eileen have driven across the country twice – with the dogs - and have had some terrific adventures.

The Sarah Dwyer WIA Board of Directors' Special Appreciation Award

Sarah Dwyer began volunteering at the festival as a massage therapist for workers and eventually served as Board president through several years of change and growth. An occupational therapist by profession, she was committed to social justice, especially for the disabled. No matter what her work with NWMF entailed, she served with deep commitment, down-to-earth practicality, and laughter.

The Sarah Dwyer WIA Board of Directors' Award is presented to Kaia Skaggs and Kate Peterson for their technical skills in editing the sound and video for the 2021 Virtual National Women's Music Festival. They both worked many long hours for the excellent online presentation.



Kaia Skaggs has been involved with NWMF for over 30 years as a performer, crew member, and audio engineer. She is a multi-

instrumentalist and sound engineer living in Ypsilanti, Michigan. Kaia studied flute performance at Vanderbilt University and cello performance at The University of Kansas. She has performed in numerous orchestras and chamber groups and as a soloist promoting the music of women composers, with performances at the National Women's Music Festival and Michigan Womyn's Music Festival, and as a member of a number of bands, including the Israeli folk group Assis Harim, 321 East Ripa, and the Community Jazz Combo. She is

also well known for her work as a sound engineer at the nationally renowned folk/ acoustic venue The Ark in Ann Arbor and for the National Women's Music Festival. A professor by trade, she teaches classes in sound engineering at The Ark and serves as a mentor for new techs. Kaia's early training as a studio musician and recording engineer helped her pivot during the pandemic to the online and streaming domain. Although the 2021 NWMF was a highlight of those efforts, she is more than grateful to be performing with and for people again.



Kate Peterson is a singer-songwriter, musician, web, graphic and app designer, and audio/video editor/producer who

Bonnie Morris, PhD is a women's history lecturer at the University of California-Berkeley and a nationally recognized expert on the role of women's music in lesbian culture. The author of sixteen books, she has devoted more than thirty years to documenting the women's music movement, first publishing *Eden Built By Eves*, a finalist for the Lambda Literary Award, and more recently *The Disappearing L* and

The Feminist Revolution. Her research on women's music, Olivia Records, and American lesbian culture will one day be housed at the Radcliffe Institute's Schlesinger Library. In the past few years Dr. Morris won a D.C. Arts and Humanities grant and a writing residency in Wales; organized the firstever exhibit on the women's music movement at the Library of Congress; arranged for Olivia albums to be part of the Smithsonian; received the Ruth Rowan Believer Award from the National Women's Music Festival; and accepted the exciting role as Olivia Records' official historian and archivist. Dr. Morris has been a featured speaker at conferences and museums throughout the country and continues to profile women's music history for the Smithsonian. As a lesbian author, she also published the time travel novel Sappho's Bar and Grill for Bywater Books, which was a Finalist for the Foreword national award in LGBT fiction and in 2018 won the Devil's Kitchen Award from Southern Illinois University. Bywater recently published the sequel, Sappho's Overhead Projector. Her latest book What's The Score, a history of women's sports is being released this month. bonniejmorris.com/

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Cathy Fink and Marcy Marxer are master musicians with a career spanning over 35 years. Their superb harmonies are backed by in strumental virtuosity on the guitar, five-

Judith Casselberry, PhD is Associate Professor of Africana Studies at Bowdoin College, teaching courses in African American religious and cultural studies, with particular attention to gender. Before her Bowdoin appointment, she was an inaugural Postdoctoral Fellow at the

Center for African American Studies at Princeton University (2008-2009). She has held visiting appointments at Wesleyan University, Barnard College, Vassar College, and New York University. She received the B. of Music from Berklee College of Music (Music Production and Engineering), MA from Wesleyan University (Ethnomusicology), and Ph.D. from Yale University (African American Studies and Anthropology). During 2012-2013, she served as Visiting Assistant Professor of Women's Studies and African American Religions in the Women's Studies in Religion Program at Harvard Divinity School.

Casselberry's interest in links between lettered and performed scholarship comes out of an inter-generational love of music and learning, which she folded into a career as an academic and performer. As a vocalist/guitarist, she currently performs with Toshi Reagon and BIGLovely and has enjoyed a career as an international recording artist with Casselberry-DuPreé and JUCA. She has shared stages with Sweet Honey in the Rock, Odetta, Stevie Wonder, Etta James, and Elvis Costello among others. She served as Production Consultant for Radical Harmonies (Dee Mosbacher, director 2002), a documentary about the women's music cultural movement, and most recently as Executive Producer of The Amazon 35 Project (2010), a multi-media project documenting a political and cultural movement by women of color and their allies within a lesbian feminist cultural movement at the Michigan Womyn's Music Festival.



Kofy Brown, an Oakland, CA musician, singer and songwriter has been a pioneering force in the Bay Area's hip-hop soul scene since the early 90's. Leading her band on tour, paving the way for other indie artist to trek forth, the KBB have spread the gospel of Brown's unique style of soul, rock, funk and more all over North America, Canada and Europe.

Suzanne Westenhoefer No one ever accused Suzanne of being subtle, not the shuttle driver who took her to the airport, the woman she was in line with at the grocery store yesterday and certainly not her audiences. Subtle, she is not. After 25 years of groundbreaking, stereotype-

shattering and brutally honest comedy, she's not about to start pulling punches now. The kid from Amish Country who began her comedy career on a dare is celebrating a quarter century of out, open, no-holds-barred comedy.

Suzanne tells the truth. The truth is life is funny, especially when it's fermented in Suzanne's mind. That's why she could never be in the closet, making her a trailblazer when she started doing stand-up in the 1990s. She was the first openly lesbian comedian with an HBO Special and the first openly lesbian comedian on "Late Night with David Letterman."

Heck, she was on Sally Jesse Raphael in 1991 on a show called "Breaking the Lesbian Stereotype...Lesbians Who Don't Look Like Lesbians." From "OMG, a lesbian has long hair and

wears make up" to "I went to Helen and Jane's wedding last weekend," that's how far we've come in the 25 years Suzanne has been telling her truth to audiences all over the world. Some of that is certainly thanks to her candor, courage and charisma.

Suzanne never does the same show twice. She can't. She doesn't write anything down. She charges boldly onto the stage and what happens is always a mystery and a delight.

Tammy Lynne Hall began playing the piano at age four, in Dallas, Texas, where she was raised by two grandmothers, a grandfather and numerous aunts and uncles. Conceived by performer/co-creator Naomi Newman, "World On Fire" is an ensemble music-theatre performance on climate change. Newman's long-time collaborator Corey Fischer (Fischer and Newman were co-founders of Traveling Jewish Theatre, 1978-2012) is directing Newman and accomplished cross-genre musicians Barbara Borden (drummer/percussionist) and Susanne DiVincenzo (bass/

cello) in this new project. "World On Fire" is anything but a conventional modern poetry reading. This work reconnects poetry to the music from which it was once inseparable. We four collaborators are shaping a performance event that uses voice, language, rhythm, melody and imagination to create a space where audiences can celebrate all existence, mourn what's been lost and discover how we might transcend our opinions, our sense of powerlessness and our fears.

Susanne DiVincenzo is a founding member of the all-women jazz quintet, Alive!, who have performed at many National Women's Music Festivals. She also played bass in the NWMF orchestra for Mary Watkins' *The Initiate* in 2016 and in concert in 2018. Suzanne plays cello and acoustic bass in the Bay Area Rainbow Symphony as well as many classical ensembles. She teaches with the ELM (Enriching Lives through Music) Program that provides musical instruction and experience to Hispanic children. She is the bass instructor with the Montclair Women's Big Band Girls' Jazz Camp at the California Jazz Conservatory. Suzanne continues with Alive! in performances and workshops. Nan Washburn (music director, conductor) is celebrating her 23rd season as Music Director of the Michigan Philharmonic and her 7th time performing at the NWMF. She is the winner of The American Prize in Orchestral Conducting, professional division 2013, The American Prize Ernst Bacon Memorial Award for the Performance of American Music, professional division 2016, and 19 ASCAP Awards for Adventurous Programming from the League of

American Orchestras. She first came to national attention as co-founder, Artistic Director, and Associate Conductor of the San Francisco-based Women's Philharmonic. As a leading authority and advocate for orchestral works by women, she serves on the board of the Women's Philharmonic Advocacy, has been recognized with the Distinguished Service Award from New York Women Composers; the Outstanding Local Hero Award from KQED, San Francisco; the Jeanine C. Rae Award from NWMF in 2016 and in 2021 she was named as one of Crain's Detroit Notable LGBTQ in Business. At NWMF, she has conducted Kay Gardner's *Ouroboros*, Mary Watkins' *The Initiate*, and Nkeiru Okoye's *Phillis Wheately* among many others.



Cara Haxo (composer) is the winner of the 2022 National Women's Musical Festival Emerging Women Composers Competition. Her music is described as "movingly lyrical" (Avant Music News) and "quirky but attractive" (The Art Music Lounge) and juxtaposes delicate, sparkly textures with the gritty and the grotesque. She was also awarded

the 2019 International Alliance for Women in Music Libby Larsen Prize, the 2013 National Federation of Music Clubs Young Composers Award, and the 2013 IAWM Ellen Taaffe Zwilich Prize, and second prize in the 2012 Ohio Federation of Music Clubs Student/Collegiate Composers Contest. She has received commissions from the May Festival Youth Chorus, Hub New Music, Quince Ensemble, and Splinter Reeds, amongst other ensembles. Recordings of her music have been released by New Focus Recordings, and her art songs are published in the NewMusicShelf Anthologies of New Music.

A native of Massachusetts, Haxo earned her Ph.D. in Composition at the University of Oregon, where she worked as a Graduate Teaching Fellow in Music Theory. She also holds degrees from Butler University and The College of Wooster. Her teachers have included Robert Kyr, David Crumb, Michael Schelle, Frank Felice, Peter Mowrey, and Jack Gallagher. She previously taught private piano, theory, and composition lessons through the Butler Community Arts School in Indianapolis, and courses in composition and theory as an Adjunct Instructor of Music at Notre Dame College (Ohio).

Haxo is a Visiting Assistant Professor in Music at The College of Wooster and an Academic Dean and faculty member for The Walden School Young Musicians Program in New Hampshire.

Joy Harjo (poet) is an internationally renowned poet, musician, playwright, and author of the Mvskoke (Creek) Nation. She is Poet Laureate of the United States, the first Native American to hold that honor and the second Poet Laureate to be appointed to three terms. Harjo is the author of nine books of poetry, including the highly acclaimed *An American Sunrise*, several plays and children's books, and two memoirs. Her many honors include

the Ruth Lily Prize for Lifetime Achievement from the Poetry Foundation, the Academy of American Poets Wallace Stevens Award, two NEA fellowships, and a Guggenheim Fellowship. As a musician, Harjo performs on saxophone and flutes, solo and with her band, the Arrow Dynamics Band, and previously with Joy Harjo and Poetic Justice. She has produced seven award-winning music albums including her newest, I Pray for My Enemies. Harjo is a chancellor of the Academy of American Poets, holds a Tulsa Artist Fellowship, directs For Girls Becoming, an arts mentorship program for young Mvskoke women, and is a founding board member and Chair of the Native Arts and Cultures Foundation. She has recently been inducted into the American Academy of Arts and Letters, the American Philosophical Society, the National Native American Hall of Fame, and the National Woman's Hall of Fame. She lives in Tulsa, Oklahoma where she is the inaugural Artist-in-Residence of the Bob Dylan Center. Harjo's "Remember" is from her collection of poetry She Had Some Horses (2008, originally published in 1983).



Dr. Rhea Olivaccé (vocal soloist) is a classically trained soprano based in Kalamazoo, Ml. Known for her "vibrant color" and "vivacious abandon," she is celebrated for her interpretation of lyric soprano roles including Mimi and Musetta from Puccini's *La Bohème*, La Contessa from Mozart's *Le Nozze di Figaro*, Tatyana from Tchaikovsky's

In Laurie's compositions, the interplay of antiphonal, rhythmic, and colorful fabric is woven around lyrical song-like melodies, a natural extension of Laurie's folk music origin as singer/songwriter from age 9 onward. A natural tendency to have percussive attributes cross over to instruments not usually slated as percussion is of particular interest, and vice versa. Instrumental role switches provide some interesting sound textures. In a recent work, *Rhythm Cordia for Solo Cello*, Laurie further blurs the idiomatic lines between cello and guitar with a variety of pizzicato techniques and col legno variations embedded into the piece. laurieajarski.com

Leslie D. Judd (orchestra coproducer), 2016 Jane Schliessman Award for Outstanding Contributions to Women's Music, began composing at the age of 12. She was one of the of the first regional Women's Music performers in Phoenix, AZ starting in 1972. Her first NWMF was 1977, the only year she was an attendee. In 1978, while visiting her daughters,

Kay Gardner heard about a rehearsal at Sisterspace where a young composer was conducting a small all women's orchestra for the Women's Studies/Fort Wayne Feminist Spirituality Conference – "Sisters' Suite." Kay suggested, that if Leslie were in Champaign-Urbana she could help with the first festival orchestra featuring special guest conductor Dr. Antonia Brico. Leslie continued to manage the orchestra for Kay at the festival and collaborated with Kay, Nancy Barrett-Thomas, and Gail Parry to co-found the New England Women's Symphony in Boston, with Nan Washburn as principal flutist. While Kay created the Acoustic Stage at Michigan along with Rachel Alexander, Leslie, along with Kaia Skaggs and Rebecca Kite, coordinated and managed the Classical Women's Music Series for NWMF Bloomington, IN, from 1982-1992. Leslie was Project Manager for Gardner's Ouroboros: Seasons of Life - Women's Passages in 1994. Between 1995 and 2010, Leslie stepped back from organizing to continue to compose. "Something was missing. The Festival was long in my heart and soul. Eventually I found my way home again."

Voted on to the Women in the Arts Board (WIA) in 2011, Leslie has worked to resurrect NWMF attendance and financial growth. The first project in 2012, Kay Gardner's *A Rainbow*

Path, suggested by Kaia Skaggs, led the way for a vast array of orchestral commissions and guest artists to be offered through today. She has also worked tirelessly to extend opportunities for recitals during the Festival. WIA Treasurer since 2014, Leslie takes leave of this position at the end of December 2022 to focus solely on composing and will continue to work with Kaia and Nan on the orchestra and related projects.


