#### 12-Step Meetings

An AA/NA Meeting will be held daily - Thurs 2pm in Amoja; Fri 2pm in Bernice; and Sat 1pm in Amoja. If you need additional support or information, stop at the Accessibility Desk in the Festival Registration area.

#### Accessibility

No flash photography. Flashes can be a serious health hazard for some people. Many people today have developed chemical sensitivities. #### **Service Dog/Pets Policy**

We want the National Women's Music Festival to be a safe and enjoyable experience for everyone. When bringing your pet or service animal to the festival, please remember that not everyone is a pet lover. Some people have a fear of dogs. Others may have allergies to specific pets. We welcome our four-legged friends and ask owners of all pets to register their pet with our Pet Coordinator in the Festival Registration area. NOTE: Non-pet owners – please ask permission before approaching or petting a pet or service animal. Festival Policy: If any dog, including a service dog, exhibits behavior that is disruptive to others, such as barking, whining, jumping, urinating indoors, or snapping, the owner is required to bring the dog under control immediately. This also goes for any other pet's behavior that may be considered disruptive to others. Third generation musician singer, **Kat Zel** has been studying and living in Edmonton the past eight years. Passionate about the vi-


brant music scene in west-



# 2023 Women in the Arts Awards

# The Jane Schliessman Award for Outstanding Contributions to Women's Music

Jane Schliessman, a native of Racine, Wisconsin, attended the I.U. School of Law in Bloomington, IN. After graduation, she made Bloomington her home and worked as an attorney for the Legal Services Organization and in private practice. She specialized in women's issues and domestic relations. Her interests revolved around the arts and included creative writing and her love for women's music. She was involved in the first group of 13 women who revived the NWMF in Bloomington in 1982.

Jane was committed to peace and social change and spent time at the Seneca Women's Encampment for a Future of Peace and Justice (known as Peace Camp), even picnicking atop a buried nuclear warhead. Jane was 35 when she died in 1986 of colon cancer.

The Jane Schliessman Award is presented to Deidre McCalla for her life-long body of music, her workshops and willingness to share it all.



In 1975 Deidre McCalla walked off the graduation dais at Vassar College directly onto the mainstage of the 2nd National Women's Music Festival in Champaign-Urbana,

IL. Since that time Deidre has maintained a consistent presence in what came to be known as Women's Music charming audiences from Maui to Maine with her engaging stage persona and songwriting chops that reveal an unvieldingly honest perspective expressed with a lyric touch that relentlessly celebrates the power and diversity of the human spirit. Deidre McCalla worked with the ground-breaking lesbian owned recording company Olivia Records for 11 years. Her first Olivia album "Don't Doubt It" is included in the LGBT Collection at the Smithsonian Institution's Museum of American History and listed by Ms Magazine as one of 25 Classic Women's Music Albums. "With A Little Luck", her second Olivia album, earned a San Francisco Cable Car Award. Her current album, "Endless Grace", has been embraced by the greater folk community as one of the 10 Best Folk Albums of 2022.

The Jeanine C. Rae Award for the Advancement of Women's Culture

Jeanine C. Rae was a guiding light to many

women's journeys during the women's movement in the 1970s and early '80s. An ordained minister, psychotherapist, political activist, and the mother of three children, Jeanine touched the lives of innumerable women throughout her short lifetime.

She was a co-founder and co-owner of The Women's Touch, Indianapolis' first women's bookstore and counseling center, in 1976. The Woman's Touch was the nucleus of a community that then created *Woman Space* newspaper, the first area hotline for women, feminist worship services, WomanShine Theatre, concert productions, and more. She was one of the midwives to the rebirth of NWMF during its move from Champaign, Illinois, to Bloomington. Her spirit continues to nurture the soul of this festival.

The Jeanine C. Rae Award is presented to MELBA'S KITCHEN for their ongoing work in creating women's culture.



MELBA'S KITCHEN is an all-women big band that celebrates Black musical geniuses Melba Liston, Mary Lou Williams, and their friends. Melba Liston (1926-1999) was a brilliant trombonist, composer and arranger who toured and wrote for Dizzy Gillespie, Quincy Jones, Gerald Wilson, and collaborated for decades - in the Ellington/ Strayhorn mode - with piano titan Randy Weston. Mary Lou Williams (1910-1981) was a virtuosic pianist, composer and arranger who worked with all the greats, including Duke Ellington. Williams was also famed for the after-hour gatherings in her Harlem apartment, where she mentored the likes of Monk, Dizzy and Sarah Vaughan. MELBA'S KITCHEN, co-led by trombonist Pat Mullan and woodwind player and Musical Director Nzingah Smith, aims to bring recognition to Liston and Williams through kindness, joy, political action, and fun. The band has performed at jazz and art destinations including YOSHI's, San Francisco's de Young Museum and the venerable Freight and Salvage.

# The Sarah Dwyer WIA Board of Directors' Special Appreciation Award is presented to Debra Hall and Dr. Mary Spillane

Sarah Dwyer began volunteering at the festival as a massage therapist for workers and eventually served as Board president

through several years of change and growth. An occupational therapist by profession, she was committed to social justice, especially for the disabled. No matter what her work with NWMF entailed, she served with deep commitment, down-to-earth practicality, and laughter.



Debra Hall is currently being happily retired and enjoying her grandchildren, playing pickle ball and ukulele as well as kayaking swimming and playing poker.

In her spare time Debra and her partner, Cookie, run a Cafe where they winter in Florida.

Debra has an Undergraduate degree in Physical Education and a Masters in Counseling Ed Psychology. As a Senior High Counselor, she developed Transitions High School in PA for recovering students. Over the span of 25 years, coached High School Volleyball, Softball, Basketball and Swimming.

Debra and her staff currently prepare meals for about 90 women, including the staff and artists, at the National Women's Music Festival. All of this with crock-pots and warming trays.



Dr. Mary Spillane has been committed to women's music since first attending the National Women's Music Festival and Michfest in 1985. She has worked in

a variety of crew positions at NWMF from 1995-present and has served on the WIA/NWMF board since 2010. Since retiring from a 40-year career as a behavioral and assistive technology consultant, Mary has enjoyed having more time to learn about and serve as board liaison for Festival Registration and the Marketplace. In addition to serving on the board, Mary currently works as the Day Programming Producer, Work Exchange Coordinator, SheRocks House Manager, and coordinates the video crew. She is very proud to be a part of the longest running women's music festival in the US.

Holly Near's parents taught her and her siblings to be curious about the world and to consider creative nonviolence.

Living on a small ranch in northern California, recordings

ordered from mail order catalogues filled the house with songs from all over the world in unfamiliar languages and multiple styles. One sister went on to be an actor/ director; another a dancer/teacher. Holly, after adventures on Broadway and in Hollywood, soon was drawn to social change music and cultural activism - joining the likes of Belafonte, Odetta, Seeger, Fonda, Gilbert, Sosa, Dr. Reagon and later, Meg Christian. Refusing single issue politics, Holly connected the dots between multiple social change movements through song and collaboration. For over 50 years Holly has been a soaring voice for consciousness, inviting us to be bravely curious about one another and ourselves. Performing artist. Vocalist. Feminist. Author. Critical thinker. Record producer. Insightful songwriter. Cancer and stroke survivor.

Barbara "Wahru"
Cleveland, scientist, educator, concert producer, musician, and activist, passed away November 13, 2022, leaving a legacy of positive influence

on the lives of others. She was passionate about social causes, generously sharing her time and talents to effect change and fight injustice.

Wahru was a trail-blazer in the quest for integrated educational opportunity in Oklahoma. Support was devoted to volunteering with many organizations: Friends of the Homeless' drug rehab program, Immigration Services, Red Cross, Pathways, Ohio Sickle Cell Association, Marysville Reformatory for Women, Girlz Rhythm n' Rock Camp.

Voting rights were important to Wahru, and she organized learning sessions in Columbus. In the early 80's, her non-profit feminist bookstore was founded and still endures as a resource center for women. At NWMF,

she led the Drum Chorus, provided drum workshops, taught self-defense, and led the Women of Color initiative and events.

**Barbara "Wahru" Cleveland** will be fondly remembered as a selfless humanitarian, with a caring heart open to all.

# The Ruth Ann Rowan Believer Award is presented to Mimi Gonzalez.

Ruth Rowan was a shero of National Women's Music Festival. She is remembered for her generous heart and enthusiasm. Ruth first attended NWMF in 1986, began serving as ASL interpreter in 1990, and was a board member from 2005 until her untimely death in 2016. She coordinated the interpreters and Marketplace. Ruth was a teacher of Deaf students and the sign language interpreter for Muse, Cincinnati Women's Choir. She was married for 30 years to her longtime love, Marsha. It was women's music and interpreting that brought their daughter, Tammy, into Ruth and Marsha's lives. They all met at a Therese Edel concert where Ruth was interpreting in 1990. Tammy became a festival favorite, often interpreting onstage with her mom.

Ruth was dedicated to keeping NWMF thriving for years to come. Not only did she contribute money personally, she produced fund raisers to benefit NWMF. Marsha remembers Ruth at the festival, saying "Sometimes she was so tired she could not move and I would think 'Why is she working so hard?' Then I would see her on stage or in the merchant area talking to women, welcoming women, and she was happily in her element. She loved this festival and did everything in her power to keep it going." Ruth was a Believer!

Since earning her MFA, she's reveled in helping others discover the joy of listening to their creative impulse and tapping into the vein of writing waiting to be heard inside themselves. An excellent community building and healing opportunity, her "Write Hear" writing workshops are indemand programming requested by LGBT

centers and online communities, including The Center in LA and Women on the Net.

2023 marks the sixth year of her post-Michfest project to create a Women's Weekend event on the first weekend in June. "Go Girl! Saugatuck" survived the pandemic shutdown of two years and is on its way to becoming the "Midwest's Dinah" where women pre-game their summer. Dance parties, workshops, shows, and an open mic at the "Gospel of YOU Brunch" celebrate all women ready to party the summer-in together in south western Michigan - just a mile from the Great Lake and right before summer solstice.

### The Sharon and Phyllis Roark Philanthropy Award is presented to Jean Arden Eversmeyer



Jean Arden Eversmeyer, 91, was born in Stevens Point, WS. She passed away November 14th, 2022.

Spending her adult life in TX, Arden earned a

Bachelor & Master degree in Education and taught 30 years in Houston public schools. Arden had two long term partners: Tommie Russum (33 years) and Charlotte Avery (31 years, married in 2008). Arden made significant contributions to the lesbian community: She founded Lesbians Over Age Fifty (LOAF;) Houston Social organization; six years Mayoral appointee to Houston Agency on Aging; founded/directed Women's Oral Herstory excerpt anthologies; served 14 years on Old Lesbians Organizing for Change steering Committee; and established an Endowment Scholarship at TX Woman's University. Among the honors Arden received: three Mayoral Proclamations; Woman Trailblazer Award from US Dept. of Energy; 2014 National Woman of Character, Courage and Commitment; Honorary Marshal, Houston Pride Parade. Arden is loved and appreciated for her contributions to NWMF.



Her film, *Vow of Silence*, was featured in film festivals around the world, including Black Star, HBO's OutFest, The Schomburg Center, Inside Out Toronto, and Fringe Fest UK. In 2017, Issa Rae featured *Vow of Silence* on her Short Film Sundays YouTube Channel.

Be has shared stages with fellow artist Activists Big Freedia, Nona Hendryx, Nikky Finney, and Gina Yashere. In 2017, Be sang at The Women's March on the National Mall behind Maxwell and Janelle Monae in Toshi Reagon's Big Lovely Band. In May 2018, Be released her newest album *Queer Love Songs*. This year, Be composed the music for The Alvin Ailey dance company's production of *The Gone*. In her latest work - *A Letter to My Ex, the musical* - Be tells stories of love, loss, and intimacy through a collage of music, movement, and film - narrating one character's journey through the year following a breakup. besteadwell.com



Bonnie Morris, PhD is a women's history lecturer at the University of California-Berkeley and a nationally recognized expert on the role of women's music in lesbian culture. The author of sixteen books, she has devoted more than thirty years to documenting the women's music movement, first publishing Eden Built By Eves, a finalist for the Lambda Literary Award, and more recently, The Disappearing L and The Feminist

Revolution. Her research on women's music, Olivia Records, and American lesbian culture will one day be housed at the Radcliffe Institute's Schlesinger Library. In the past few years, Dr. Morris won a D.C. Arts and Humanities grant and a writing residency in Wales; organized the first-ever exhibit on the women's music movement at the Library of Congress; arranged for Olivia albums to be part of the Smithsonian; received the Ruth Rowan Believer Award from the National Women's Music Festival; and accepted the exciting role as Olivia Records' official historian and archivist. Dr. Morris has been a featured speaker at conferences and museums throughout the country and continues to profile women's music history for the Smithsonian. As a lesbian author, she also published the time travel novel Sappho's Bar and Grill for Bywater Books, which was a Finalist for the Foreword national award in LGBT fiction. In 2018, she won the Devil's Kitchen Award from Southern Illinois University. Bywater recently published the sequel, Sappho's Overhead Projector. Her latest book What's The Score, a history of women's sports, was released in 2022. bonniejmorris.com/



Deidre McCalla doesn't merely take the stage – she owns it. Her songs embody hope and celebration, struggle, loss, and longing – sometimes all in one song! Her powerful songwriting exhibits an unyieldingly honest perspective grounded in her life and expressed with a lyric touch that is simple and direct – and fearlessly celebrates the power and diversity of the human spirit.

A singer-songwriter-guitarist for close to five decades, Deidre is a Black woman, mother, lesbian, feminist who has long been in the forefront of the growing number of Black musicians reconfiguring perceptions of how Black folk do folk. A much beloved performer in folk and women's music circles, Deidre has shared the stage with a long list of notables that includes Suzanne Vega, Tracy Chapman, Holly Near, Odetta, Cris Williamson, and Sweet Honey in the Rock.

With five independent albums to her credit, she has touched audiences from Maui to Maine, in church basements and college coffeehouses, and Carnegie Hall. Her most recent release, *Endless Grace*, dominated the June 2022 Folk Radio Charts as the #1 Album. *PopMatters, Rhythms Magazine*, and the Folk Alley Listener Favorites Poll ranked *Endless Grace* among the Ten Best Folk albums for 2022. Her first Olivia Records album, *Don't Doubt It*, is listed as one of 25 Classic Women's Music Albums by *Ms. Magazine*. In 2021, Deidre received a SERFA Award from the Southeast Regional Folk Alliance for distinguished service and exceptional contributions to folk music in the Southeast region of Folk Alliance International.

Dianne Davidson is a singer, songwriter, guitarist, performer, and producer whose style and range escape categorization. There are a lot of good singers around today and a lot of talented musicians. There are performers who draw large crowds wherever they play. But there are few true artists. An artist leaves a lasting impression because what they express

is unique. Dianne is an artist. Be it blues, rock, folk, or even reggae, she performs with a robust intensity taking her listeners on a musical journey that few are likely to forget.

Born in West Tennessee, Dianne was a gifted and precocious child singing and writing songs at an early age and forming her first band at age eleven. At seventeen, she opted for an album in lieu of a diploma, and fine-tuned her school of rock education in settings as diverse as rowdy West Tennessee bars, California nightclubs, Greenwich Village listening rooms, major festivals, and, in time, Carnegie Hall.

Dianne has recorded five albums, toured as a member of Linda Ronstadt's band, and has provided backing vocals for a host of major league performers such as B.B. King, Jimmy Buffet, Tammy Wynette, Barry Manilow, and Leon Russell. diannedavidson.com

Holly Near is still one of the most consistent and well-informed voices for change, even after 50 years of bold work. Her work is loving, challenging, funny, thought provoking, and remains rooted in the global community. As an outspoken singer and ambassador for peace, Holly brings a unique integration of world consciousness and self-evaluation, always growing and sharing

experience humbly and boldly.

Holly discovered her unique and recognizable voice at an early age, learning to sing along with recordings of some of the world's great singers. Throughout her career, she has enjoyed collaborations with such artists as Mercedes Sosa, Ronnie Gilbert, Inti Illimani, and Emma's Revolution. In 1974, she started sharing paths and songs with the wave of new lesbian feminist performers such as Meg Christian, Cris Williamson, Linda Tillery, Mary Watkins, and Alive! She dove into the feminist movement, trying to understand the depth of sexism and homophobia by turning those lessons into song.

As a songwriter, Holly takes up the challenge of turning big concepts into small, personal stories. In response to the slaughter of the students at Kent State, she wrote *It Could Have Been Me*. Following the assassinations of Mayor George Moscone and Supervisor Harvey Milk in San Francisco, she penned *Singing For Our Lives*, which became an anthem for the LGBTQ community and appears in the Unitarian Church hymnal.

In 2019, Holly began a website project called *Because of a Song*, an online historic archive that documents some of the influential artists that rose from the feminist lesbian music scene in Oakland, California. The site can be viewed at becauseofasong.com

A recipient of dozens of awards from organizations such as the ACLU and the National Organization of Women, Holly was one of Ms. Magazine's Women of the Year recipients and has been nominated for Grammys as well as the Legends of Women's Music Award. hollynear.com/



Indigie Femme has circled the globe, stirring audiences and gathering fans for more than a decade. Along the way, they've been 2017 Indigenous Music Award nominees; 2016, 2014 and 2012 New Mexico Music Award winners; 2013 Aboriginal Peoples Choice as Best International Duo; 2011 Native American Music Award winners

and Sacramento Women of Color & Diversity Honorees; and 2010

Canadian Aboriginal Music Awards. They are especially well known in the two-spirit world of indigiqueer performance.

Elena Higgins (Maori/Samoan) and Tash Terry (Navajo/French/Irish) are only two women but they represent nearly a dozen ethnic traditions. In dark times and light, their unique blend of harmonies, rhythms, and instrumentation leave audiences spellbound and hopeful. Elena's rich voice has been compared to that of Etta James and Tash has been said to echo Melissa Etheridge.

Elena brings her Maori and Samoan ancestors from New Zealand in new and moving vocals. Whether strumming her Australian Maton (upside-down guitar), offering harmonies or performing sweet acapella, she moves her audience to embrace her glorious smile and haunting sounds.

Tash comes from the Navajo Nation bringing with her that Nation's songs and stories. She grew up hearing the mystical music of her masani (grandmother) whose awe for mother earth and devotion to Navajo ways was unshakable. Tash now renders that enduring spirit through her own musical interpretations both traditional and modern.

Renée Janski is the right rockin' reverend! She adds pagan gospel flair and jazz stylings to every performance, be it choral or solo. She's been a music director and performer for over 30 years. Janski has toured with Big Bad Gina and works with Pianolingus and Muses on the Road. She has 5 albums and is working on her 6th. She is a celebrated composer, choral director,

and arranger. Janski has served her local UU congregation since 2007. She resides in the Ozark mountains of Arkansas with her wife, RJ, and their dogs, Dolly and Rainbow.



**Ruth King** is a blues recording artist whose music is original and heartfelt - described as Acoustic Blues. The show draws on the eclectic shades of her musical origins and reaches into the soul of true folk, soul, jazz, rock, and blues enthusiasts.

Born listening to Dot Records' rhythm and blues recording artists from

Washington, D.C. in the late 50s, Ruth was surrounded by the live original music of her parents. Music which inspired her early years of self-taught guitar playing, singing, and songwriting. In later childhood years, her step-dad, an outstanding jazz drummer, filled their home with the musical genres of jazz and swing music.

Her debut album, *Attache*, was released in the mid-1990s and her single, "Back to Start" received accolades with radio airplay. Ruth's next three records found her career increasing in visibility. Studies at FSU School of Music instructed her in classical voice training and song composition - giving way to practical applications in production as she wrote musical parts for strings, brass, and the bassoon on her latest CD, *HOME*. *HOME* is now featured worldwide on popular music streaming platforms.

Having performed for many at the House of Blues, on concert stages, college circuits, and for music festival audiences nationwide, 2023 finds Ruth singing songs and presenting programs on the topics which match the release of her long-awaited memoir, *RUTH*. Ruth brings hope, healing, and a unique rhythm to our World today through her life, writings, and music.



**SONIA disappear fear** is a world class composer and artist whose talent for writing in a variety of genres and languages has garnered her a vast following worldwide. SONIA's double CD, *LiVE at MAXIMAL*, was in the first round running Grammy for Folk Album of the Year.

Looking at her touring schedule past and future (over 20 countries so far), one can trace decades of dedication to various humanitarian and animal rights' causes. Her 2019 CD, *By My Silence*, is in response to the rise of hate and anti-Semitism around the world. Her 2020 compilation, *Love Out Loud*, encourages people to embrace their identity while highlighting the ongoing push for LGBT equality.

From the Sydney Opera House to the Kerrville Folk Festival and a

bomb shelter in the Negev, she has shared stages and caves with many of her heroes; Pete Seeger, Joan Baez, Nickel Creek, Green Day, Emmylou Harris, GEORGE, John Fullbright, Sheryl Crow, Lucinda Williams, Joan Jett, and Bruce Springsteen at the Light of Day Benefit concert (2014).

Awards include 6 GLAMAs including Female Artist of the Year; GLAAD (Gay and Lesbian American Anti-Defamation) Award for Best Album (previous recipient Elton John); Coin of Honor from a joint coalition of the United States Military for her humanitarian efforts; and Spirit of Folk Music Award from Folk Alliance International (2017).

Tammy Lynne Hall began playing the piano at age four, in Dallas, Texas, where she was raised by two grandmothers, a grandfather and numerous aunts and uncles. Her earliest memories of the piano were of climbing onto the piano bench and picking out the notes to tunes she heard on the radio, the record player, or something the choir sang at church. A young pianist for several

churches and choirs; juried recitals that led to awards in regional and national competitions; and attending the prestigious and progressive Mills College in Oakland, CA made it quite evident that Music had chosen Tammy to walk its path. These early experiences would form the triad of Tammy's core sound: a fusion of Jazz, Gospel and Classical.

In pursuit of developing her own voice and the experiences of a 'Jazz' life, Tammy left Mills College and gained more improvisational and accompanying experience sitting in with local bands in the Bay Area and then in Brussels for 2 years. Back in the Bay Area, she has worked with vocalists Etta Jones, Holly Near, Linda Tillery, Pamela Rose, Melba Moore, Queen Esther Marrow, award-winning cabaret singer and actress Connie Champagne, the Supreme Mary Wilson, The Montclair Women's Big Band, violinist Regina Carter, drummer and bandleader Allison Miller, and many more.

In 2017, Tammy received the award for Best Musical Direction from the Bay Area Theatre Critics Circle for her work in Pamela Rose's Blues Is A Woman.

Tammy's continued involvement with her musical and cultural community include working as an instructor/lecturer (faculty)/ mentor with a number of schools and non-profit arts organizations dedicated to making music and theatre accessible to under-funded inner-city children in and around the Bay Area. In 2019, Tammy was recognized by the San Francisco Chapter of the Human Rights Commission, as one of the recipients of its inaugural Pleasant-Leidesdorff San Francisco Community Stalwart Award.

# Orchestra Profiles



Nan Washburn (music director, conductor) will celebrate her 25th season as Music Director of the Michigan Philharmonic and her 8th time performing at the NWMF. She is the winner of The American Prize in Orchestral Conducting, professional division 2013, The American Prize Ernst Bacon Memorial Award for the Performance of American Music, professional division, 2016, and 19

ASCAP Awards for Adventurous Programming from the League of American Orchestras. She first came to national attention as a co-founder, Artistic Director, and Associate Conductor of the San Francisco-based Women's Philharmonic. As a leading authority and advocate for orchestral works by women, she serves on the board of the Women's Philharmonic Advocacy; has been recognized with the Distinguished Service Award from New York Women Composers; the Outstanding Local Hero Award from KQED, San Francisco; the Jeanine C. Rae Award from NWMF in 2016; and in 2021, she was named as one of Crain's Detroit Notable LGBTQ in Business. At NWMF she has conducted the world premieres of Kay Gardner's Ouroboros in 1994, Mary Watkins' The Initiate in 2016, and Cara Haxo's Remember in 2022.



(composer Alice Gomez and percussionist). Alice Gomez's compositions capture the aweinspiring spirit of ethnicity in the language of contemporary music. Her first orchestral composition, Primitive Echoes, was premiered in November of 1992. Primitive Echoes is a Native American inspired Concerto for Timpani and Chamber Orchestra and was the

catalyst for Gomez's career as a symphonic composer. In 1993, she received a three-year award from Meet The Composer, Inc., to serve as Composer in Residence for The San Antonio Symphony and The Guadalupe Dance Company. She composed several Central American inspired works with the intent of drawing in new symphony audience members from San Antonio's largely Latino community. After completing a very successful residency, Gomez was able to sustain a steady influx of commissions for new works, while building an international reputation as one of the leading Latina composers of concert music.

Alice Gomez has received numerous Composer's Awards from the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers (ASCAP). Her music is performed by symphony orchestras, choirs, dance companies, theaters, solo instrumentalists, and at institutions of higher learning and musical study. Gomez's contributions to a multitude of musical genres are internationally acclaimed.



Mary Watkins (composer) is an eclectic composer as well as a pianist, arranger, recording artist, and record producer. Much of her music reflects a love for many styles – jazz, gospel, country, rock, classical and pop. She has composed for solo piano for both adults and children;

for wind ensembles, string quartet, chamber, and full symphony orchestra; for solo vocalist, vocal ensemble, and large chorus; and for theater, dance, and film. She is the recipient of awards from several granting foundations including Opera, America, Meet The Composer, National Endowment for the Arts, Gerbodi Foundation, Zellerbach Family Fund and Calfornia Council for the Arts. She was chosen for the first commission awarded by the NWMF Orchestra for creation of The Initiate, which received its world premiere at the 2016 festival. She has completed five operas; the latest, Emmett Till, created with Clara Coss as librettist, premiered in New York City, March 2022.



**Dr. Olga Draguieva** (violin 1) has won violin competitions in Bulgaria and the U.S. At 16 she became a member of the Gustav Mahler Youth Orchestra and played in concert tours of Europe and Asia. In Bulgaria, she served as associate concertmaster of the New Symphony Orchestra-Sofia. In the U.S., Olga has played with Tampa Opera, Southwest Florida Symphony Orchestra, and Florida Orchestra. She is a member of the Madison Symphony Orchestra and regularly performs

with the Wisconsin Chamber Orchestra. Olga holds a DMA degree from UW-Madison in Violin Performance. She has made the world premiere recording of Pieces for Solo Violin by Bulgarian Composers. Dr. Draguieva maintains a private violin studio on the west side of Madison.



Alexis Carreon (viola). For more than 3 decades, violist and violinist Alexis Carreon has performed as a soloist, principal, and ensemble player for numerous chamber and symphony orchestras in the Los Angeles, Madison, and Chicago areas. She is a versatile performer in many musical genres, including solo, chamber, symphonic,

operatic, Broadway, world, and jazz, as well as in film and television. Alexis' live performances, recordings, and tours include Aretha Franklin, Bonnie Raitt, John Tesh, Rod Stewart, Michael Crawford, Tony Bennett, David Arkenstone, James Galway, Nita Whitaker, David Foster, Wayne Newton, David Benoit, Suzanna Guzman, Barry Manilow, Herbie Hancock, Stanley Clarke, Chick Corea, Enrique Iglesias and others. Alexis performed Kay Gardner's A Rainbow Path in 2012 and performed subsequent years with the NWMF Orchestra and ensembles. She is always thrilled to be working with Nan Washburn, Leslie Judd and all of the talented NWMF musicians! Presently Alexis is the Office/Personnel Manager and substitute violist of the Madison Symphony Orchestra.



Carol Rosing (bassoon) is a native of Portage, WI. She received her Bachelor of Music degree in Bassoon Performance at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, studying with Richard Lottridge, and her Master of Music Degree and Professional Studies Degree in Bassoon Performance at the Manhattan School of Music, where she

studied with David Carroll and Frank Morelli, respectively.

Carol is currently the principal bassoon in the Oshkosh Symphony, contrabassoon in the Madison Symphony, and second bassoon in the Wisconsin Wind Orchestra. In addition, she was principal bassoon in the Beloit Janesville Symphony for 15 years, and has also performed with the Milwaukee Symphony, the Milwaukee Chamber Orchestra, Green Bay Symphony, Fox Valley Symphony, Dubuque Symphony, Wisconsin Philharmonic, Racine Symphony, Kenosha Symphony, Orchestra Iowa, and Wisconsin Chamber Orchestra. She has performed internationally with groups in England, Scotland, Austria, and Italy. Carol also has vast chamber music experience, having performed with numerous woodwind quintets, trios, and chamber ensembles over the years.

Carol currently serves as the Bassoon Lecturer at the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh, as well as the Lecturer of Bassoon at the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater, and the Bassoon Instructor at Beloit College. She also maintains a private teaching studio.



Emily Hancock appears in the third episode of season three of Now Hear This, the PBS travel series hosted by acclaimed violinist Scott Yoo which focuses on the histories and stories of classical composers. The third episode features the music and backstory of Aaron Copland and was filmed during the 2021 Colorado College Summer Music Festival. You can also hear Emily

on Spotify and Apple Music performing with the Oberlin Orchestra in a recording of Jesse Jones' "Innumerable Stars, Scattered in Clusters."

As a student at Oberlin, Emily co-founded the organization Oberlin Students for Gender Inclusivity in Music (OSGIM) whose purpose is to celebrate women, transgender, and non-binary classical and contemporary musicians and composers through the organization of recitals, talks, and other events. OSGIM sponsored an Oberlin Winter Term orchestra and choir in January 2020 that performed exclusively music by women and transgender composers.

Kaia Skaggs (flute). Kaia is a multiinstrumentalist and sound engineer living in Ypsilanti, Michigan. She studied flute performance at Vanderbilt University and cello performance at The University of Kansas. She has performed in numerous orchestras and chamber groups over the years and as a soloist promoting the music of women composers. Her performances include appearances at the National Women's Music Festival and Michigan Womyn's

Music Festival and touring Israel with the folk group Assis Harim. Kaia played flute and recorder in the first live performance of Kay Gardner's A Rainbow Path and was a member of the orchestra for

the premiere NWMF performances of Gardner's Ouroboros, Mary Watkins' The Initiate, and Cara Haxo's Remember. The reprisal of A Rainbow Path at the 2012 NWMF was Kaia's dream. She is better known in recent years for her work as a sound engineer at the nationally renowned folk/acoustic venue The Ark in Ann Arbor and as the Main Stage sound engineer for the National Women's Music Festival.



**Dr. Laura Medisky** (oboe) is an oboist and Alexander Technique teacher based in Madison, WI. She served as Acting Principal Oboe of the Wisconsin Chamber Orchestra from 2016-22 and in the Rockford Symphony from 2021-23. She has been a member of the Madison Symphony Orchestra, and also performs with the Elgin and Dubuque Symphonies, Fresco Opera, Capital City Theatre, and Bach Dancing and Dynamite Society. Medisky has

performed concertos with orchestras in Wisconsin, Nebraska, Illinois, and Idaho. Her solo album, Personalities: 21st-century American Music for Oboe, was released in 2012 on the Centaur Records label.

As a guest artist, Medisky presents oboe masterclasses and Alexander Technique workshops at music institutions and conferences throughout the United States. At home in Madison, she is the owner of the thriving Medisky Oboe Studio LLC and is a regular clinician for area schools. Recognized for her creativity and innovation in studio teaching, Medisky was a featured guest on the "Mavericks" series of the podcast Double Reed Dish. In 2018, Medisky co-founded the LunART Festival in Madison, serving as a Festival Director for the first two seasons. She has served on faculty at UW-Platteville, Luther College, Maranatha Baptist University, and Edgewood College.



Laurie A. Jarski (cello) is a composer, cellist, singer/songwriter, guitarist, multi-string instrumentalist, and owner/director of Broughton Music Center, Northville Center for Music & Art, & WPI Festival On the Land Music Camp for Women & Girls. Laurie is a professional cellist in the C•O•R•Etet String Quartet, Octocelli Cello

Ensemble, Presence of Three Trio, Red Willow Dream, the Battle Creek Symphony, and has served as principal cellist with the NWMF Orchestra. She currently coaches a 'String Quartet Plus' program in Northville & Kalamazoo for youth & adult string players, and coached at a Sturgis Chamber String Music Retreat.

Laurie is co-producing an original album scheduled for release in early 2024. Her recent composition commissions include The Nine Trees of KL Ave, 2021, for banjo, minstrel banjo, mandolin, dulcimer, string quartet & percussion, as a part of 'The Music In Place' project and the Egyptian Blue Jazz Bowl for Solo Guitar & Untitled Brazilian Mirage for two cellos, minstrel banjo, classical guitar, doumbek & egg shakers was commissioned for the Kalamazoo Institute of Art's Unveiling American Genius Resonance Music Project, 2020.

Laurie has composed commissions for orchestra, chamber orchestra, choir, and a variety of chamber ensemble pieces. Larger ensemble and orchestral compositions include, 'God Rest Ye! Orchestral Renderings'; 2015, 'Funky Blues for Cello Quartet'; 2012, 'The

Star to Every Wandering Bark' for Choir, Chamber Orchestra, and Percussion; 2010, Travel Modalities for 16 Celli; 2008, An Amethyst Remembrance for Mezzo Soprano, Chamber Choir and Orchestra; 1995. Laurie's interplay of antiphonal, rhythmic, and colorful fabric is woven around lyrical song-like melodies, a natural extension of Laurie's folk music origin, as singer/ songwriter from age 9 and onward. A natural tendency to have percussive attributes cross over to instruments not usually slated as percussion, is of particular interest, and vice versa. Instrumental role switches, provide some interesting sound textures! In a recent work, Rhythm Cordia for Solo Cello, Laurie further blurs the idiomatic lines between cello and guitar, with a variety of pizzicato techniques, and col legno variations embedded into the piece.



Maynie Bradley (violin 2) began playing the violin at age three with the Suzuki Strings of Madison. She went on to study with professors Eugene Purdue and David Perry, graduating with distinction from UW Madison with degrees in music performance and psychology. Starting in September 2022, she will be a member of the

Griffon String Quartet, an ensemble based in Door County, WI. Maynie is passionate about providing stimulating and fulfilling education for children of all ages and backgrounds. Her experience includes teaching at Music con Brio, an inclusive and community-based music program in Madison and providing autism therapy to children through Achieving Collaborative Treatment (ACT). She also participated in a workshop with members of the New-York based ensemble Decoda to study community engagement through music. Additionally, she has coached chamber groups with the Wisconsin Youth Symphony Orchestras (WYSO) and volunteered with Madison Music Makers.



**Dr. Sarah L. Gillespie** (French horn, celesta) is Instructor of Horn at the University of Wisconsin-Platteville. She received her Doctorate of Musical Arts and a Masters in Horn Performance from the University of Wisconsin-Madison and her Bachelor of Horn Performance and Music Education degrees from Louisiana State University. Sarah hosts a private studio of students aged 9-90 and

believes that music education is for everyone and for life. Sarah is third horn of the La Crosse Symphony Orchestra and freelances with various orchestras in Wisconsin and Iowa. Chamber music is her favorite genre of music to perform and she performs regularly with the Underground Chamber Collective, Pensissimo Woodwind Quintet, and Third Lake Brass Quintet. Sarah, an advocate for women composers, has premiered works at the National Women's Music Festival, the LunART Festival, and the International Women in Brass Conference. She also sings as a choral section leader at St. Bernard's Catholic Church and as a cantor and soloist at eight parishes throughout the Catholic Diocese of Madison. When she is not performing, Sarah might be found hiking with her husband or biking around Madison's beautiful lakes.



**Dr. Susan Gaeddert** (piano, keyboard) is active in the Madison area as a collaborative pianist, working with professional musicians and students of all ages coaching singers and instrumentalists for auditions and performances. She has toured the state with Opera for The Young, taught at Edgewood College, taught private and group lessons, and performed with a number of local musicians at festivals and recitals in the

Madison area. Susan holds degrees in Piano Performance, Pedagogy, and Collaborative Piano. Recently, she embarked on a career change and obtained a degree in Urban/Regional Planning from UW-Madison, graduating in 2020. She now works as Community Programs Director for 1000 Friends of Wisconsin, an organization specializing in land use and transportation planning. Susan is excited to be back at NWMF in 2023!



Susanne DiVincenzo (contrabass) is a founding member of the all women jazz quintet, Alive! who have performed at many National Women's Music Festivals. She played cello with the first NWMF Orchestra conducted by Antonia Brico in 1978 in Champaign-Urbana. She has also played bass in recent NWMF Orchestras, including this year's NWMF Women's Composers Series Presents. She is

currently involved in many musical projects: teaching workshops at the CA Jazz Conservatory in Berkeley, CA and playing with the newly formed trio with Terry Garthwaite and Barbara Borden called "Joy Alive!." Together with Barbara Borden and Naomi Newman, she has been writing music for the new play, "Between Worlds" produced by the Yiddish Ensemble Theatre, about the lesbian poet and Warsaw ghetto survivor, Irena Klepfisz. The play will be produced at the Live Oak Theatre in Berkeley, CA in August, 2023. Susanne will be playing bass on the SheRocks stage on Sunday with Melba's Kitchen, the 14-woman big band featuring the compositions and arrangements of Melba Liston and Mary Lou Williams from the 1940s. The Melba's Kitchen Ensemble will also be featuring New Standards by Women in the Atrium during the Festival.






