



2024 Women in the Arts Awards

The Jane Schliessman Award for Outstanding Contributions to Women's Music

Jane Schliessman, a native of Racine, Wisconsin, made Bloomington her home and worked as an attorney for the Legal Services Organization and in private practice. She specialized in women's issues and domestic relations. Her interests revolved around the arts and included creative writing and her love for women's music. She was involved in the first group of 13 women who revived the NWMF in Bloomington in 1982.

Jane was committed to peace and social change and spent time at the Seneca Women's Encampment for a Future of Peace and Justice (known as Peace Camp) Jane was 35 when she died in 1986 of colon cancer.

The 2024 Jane Schliessman Award is presented to Teresa Trull for her work as a producer of independent women's music albums and ongoing involvement in women's music.



Teresa Trull is a fiery haired vocal dynamo who combines a gutsy blues/rock style, top notch songwriting talents,

and sharp producing instincts in her many high energy projects. She has made 5 of her own recordings, including two successful duo pairings both with Barbara Higbie and Cris Williamson (*Country Blessed* 1990). An accomplished producer of over 30 albums, Teresa was named best producer of an Independent Album at the New York Music Awards. She has shared the stage with Sheila E., David Sanborn, Joan Baez and many others.

The 2024 Jane Schliessman Award is presented to Barbara Higbie in honor of her ability to bring women's music to a variety of audiences as she masterfully performs across a wide variety of musical genres.



Barbara Higbie has been called a bolt of bright sunlight by the LA Times and a "classy talent" by the Boston Globe. She is a Grammy-nominated,

Bammy award winning composer, pianist, singer-songwriter and championship fiddle player with 14 solo and group CD's. She has recorded with Carlos Santana, Bonnie Raitt, Cris Williamson, Holly Near, Teresa Trull and many others. Barbara was the first woman to be signed to the ground breaking instrumental label, Windham Hill Records,

appearing on 7 of their *Winter Solstice* CD's. Her live show is a high energy mix of original tunes, blues, country, folk and fast fiddling. She was awarded a Watson Fellowship to collect traditional music in French West Africa. Her first solo CD on Sony Records was named "Top Ten of the Year" by the Washington Post. In 2011, Higbie was named the first "Artist in Residence" for the famed West Coast jazz club, Yoshi's. Her most recent album, 2024's *Solstice* is a compliment to her popular *Chillogy* 3 popular albums, 2019's *Resonance*, 2021's *Murmuration* and 2022's *Presence*.

Barbara is Co-Chair of the Board of Directors for the Freight and Salvage venue in Berkeley, CA.

The Jeanine C. Rae Award for the Advancement of Women's Culture

Jeanine C. Rae was a guiding light to many women's journeys during the women's movement in the 1970s and early '80s. An ordained minister, psychotherapist, political activist, and the mother of three children, Jeanine touched the lives of innumerable women throughout her short lifetime.

She was a co-founder and co-owner of The Women's Touch, Indianapolis' first women's bookstore and counseling center, in 1976. The Woman's Touch was the nucleus of a community that then created *Woman Space* newspaper, the first area hotline for women, feminist worship services, WomanShine Theatre, concert productions, and more. She was one of the midwives to the rebirth of NWMF during its move from Champaign, IL to Bllomington, IN. Her spirit continues to nurture the soul of this festival.

The 2024 Jeanine C. Rae Award is presented to Tammy Hall in recognition of her continual willingness to share her musical knowledge and expertise through mentoring, nurturing, and developing the skills of other women musicians.



Tammy Hall has been inspiring the growth of new artists by sharing her vast language of the universal force of music. Her passion for music was sparked at

an early age in churches, listening to the early Jazz greats, blues, R & B, Pop. Her talents opened the door for production and theater opportunities.

Currently Tammy serves as Lead Teaching artist at the prestigious SF Jazz. In 2017, Tammy received the award for Best Musical Direction from the Bay Area Theatre Critics

Circle, for her work in Pamela Rose's Blues Is A Woman. This is one of several forays into musical theatre as Musical Director, including Sister Act:The Musical (Theatre Rhino), Chance by Richard Isen, and Quantum Janis, in development, also by Richard Isen.

Tammy's continued involvement with her musical and cultural community include working as an instructor, lecturer, faculty, mentor with a number of schools and non-profit arts organizations dedicated to making music and theatre accessible to underfunded inner city children and well known and funded organizations.

The Sarah Dwyer WIA Board of Directors' Special Appreciation Award

Sarah Dwyer began volunteering at the festival as a massage therapist for workers and eventually served as Board president through several years of change and growth. An occupational therapist by profession, she was committed to social justice, especially for the disabled. No matter what her work with NWMF entailed, she served with deep commitment, down-to-earth practicality, and laughter.

The 2024 Sarah Dwyer WIA Board of Directors' Special Appreciation Award is presented to Colleen Clark in recognition of her commitment to fostering the next generation of women sound and video technicians through the development of the first NWMF Internship program.



Colleen Clark is a musician, audio engineer, and educator from Salisbury, MD. She holds a Bachelor's in Mathematics and Music Theory from the University of Notre Dame and a Master's in Audio

Science from the Peabody Conservatory of the Johns Hopkins University. As a musician, Colleen has performed with many groups on the women's music circuit, including Christine Havrilla & Gypsy Fuzz, Mama's Black Sheep, Red Letter Day, the Zen Monkeys, and SONiA disappear fear, and she currently works as the front-of-house engineer at both the Virginia Women's Music Festival and the National Women's Music Festival. Colleen has also worked as a producer and recording engineer on a variety of projects, including two full-length solo albums of her own. She is currently the Chair of the Music Program at Salisbury University in Salisbury, MD, where she also teaches courses in audio production, live sound engineering, acoustics, and ear training.

2024 Women in the Arts Awards

The 2024 Sarah Dwyer WIA Board of Directors' Special Appreciation Award is presented to Kristin Lems in recognition of the fact that, without Kristin's vision and hard work, NWMF would not be here today.



In 2003, the Chicago Tribune, in a full-page feature about **Kristin Lems**, used her quote in the headline: "I want to make it better for the next woman."

For 50 years, Kristin

Lems, a versatile composer, performing songwriter, folksinger and playwright has traveled and organized around women's rights, gay and lesbian rights, safe energy, peace, racial equality, and other pressing issues. Her iconic feminist songs include *Ballad of the ERA* and *Mammary Glands*, considered a feminist punk classic.

In 1974, she was the catalyst and founder of NWMF at the University of Illinois, Champaign, IL. Over the next 5-years, she worked as a full-time volunteer and noted women "came to protest and celebrate" women's music and community. And they did so for 45 years to follow.

She is "overwhelmed with gratitude, pride, and awe to witness the growth of this wonderful Festival, which offers women, girls, and feminists of all persuasions a safe and nurturing place to learn, share, and heal through the power of music."

The Kristin Lems Social Change Award

is presented to a women's music or comedy artist who has worked to achieve a positive change in society and whose continued actions have profoundly impacted a social movement through the use of music or comedy. Kristin Lems started the National Women's Music Festival at the University of Illinois out of her determination to make women's voices heard. She is still working for women's rights, safe energy, peace, racial equality, and other pressing causes.

50th National Women's Music Festival July 2-5, 2026 The 2024 Kristin Lems Social Change Through Music Award is presented to Ubaka Hill in recognition of her use of drumming and poetry to inspire empowerment, healing, self-discovery and positive social change among audiences, at each and every one of her performances.



Ubaka Hill is an inspirational visionary artist who leads by helping women to improve their quality of life through art,

music performances, and workshops. She uses the creative arts and music to inspire empowerment, healing and positive social change on the path of self-discovery. In addition to being a well-known teacher and performer at women's music festivals, Ubaka is the founder and director of multiple community initiatives. include the Million Women Drummers Global Initiative; the Drumsong Institute of Women's Drumming Traditions, the first known museum and archival collection of women's drums and percussive instruments and related items, the Drumsong Orchestra, and the Catskill Women's World Drum and Percussion Happen'n. Ubaka also established the DrumMa Award which has been presented to seven women drummers/ visionaries since 2007. Ubaka has been acknowledged for her leadership and influence for positive social change through the arts and inspirational public speaking, including receiving the 2019 "Agent of Change - Voices In Action" Award presented by the TMI Project.

The 2024 Kristin Lems Social Change Through Comedy Award is presented to Robin Tyler both in recognition of her status as the first out lesbian to be seen on national television and her lifelong commitment to activism and advocacy, especially her work with women's comedy and music festivals.



Robin Tvler is the first lesbian or gay comic to come on out national television, a feminist and pioneer in the grassroots struggle for LGBTQ civil rights and marriage equality in the U.S., and a producer. She

emceed and produced the main stage at three marches on Washington for LGBTQ rights, including the historic first National March On Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights in 1979. Tyler coined the phrase "We are everywhere" as a rallying cry for the LGBTQ community. This became the powerful signature chant of the 1979 march, appearing on banners and posters. The chant "We are everywhere" has continued as a popular rallying cry for LGBTQ equality. Robin states that she gave former Festival Producer, Mary Byrne, music festival production 101 class in the early days of this festival. We are forever grateful.

The Women in the Arts Technical Skills Award recognizes an individual whose skill in sound, lighting, or video production ensures our stage performances are the best and ones we all look forward to every year!

The 2024 Women in the Arts Technical Skills Award is presented to **Suzanna Mallow** for her work in redesigning the sound on the Spotlight Stage and assisting wherever and whenever needed with all things "tech".



Suzanna Mallow,

Production Director for the Department of Music, Theatre and Dance at Salisbury University in Salisbury Maryland, developed her tech skills initially

through her career as a touring musician, solo, with Red Letter Day and with The Zen Monkeys. She was also an adjunct faculty member teaching Beginning Audio Production courses and co-facilitating a Business and Entrepreneurship course. She honed graphic design skills in Adobe Creative Suites that she used for promotional materials for her music career and now for projection graphics for large scale events and video production. Her music production and live sound skills came from live performance management and running a recording studio for 25 years where she once employed Main stage engineer Colleen Clark who, ironically, is now her boss as Music Chair! Suzanna dabbles in stage lighting especially in manipulating LED movers for stage design...but still bows to Root for her beautiful traditional gobo designs used to light the main stage at NWMF!

She has played on over 100 albums including 3 tunes on the recent Carlos Santana CD. A longtime Windham Hill recording artist, she has also recorded for Olivia/Second Wave records and Slow Baby Records. She resides in the San Francisco Bay Area with her family. She is

a folk, jazz, pop, and fusion singer-songwriter, noted for her highly melodic, jazz/folk piano performances. She has toured nationally and internationally since the early 1980s. An early recording artist on the Windham Hill record label, she formed and played with the group Montreux along with Darol Anger, Mike Marshall, Todd Phillips, and Michael Manring. She recorded a critically acclaimed album with singer Teresa Trull in 1983 and again in 1998. Since 1990, Barbara Higbie has released a number of solo albums on Slow Baby Records, and performs widely with Linda Tillery, Teresa Trull, and other various artists. Yearly, she performs Winter Solstice Concerts with Liz Story, and other Windham Hill artists. She tours nationally and internationally, and is the mother of daughter, Lena. barbarahigbie.com



Bitch makes witchy poet pop. She does it with violins and synthesizers, and the songs she writes are spectral, heartbreaking, political, and beautiful. *Bitchcraft* is the long-standing queer icon's 9th studio album.

In the mid 2000s, Bitch went solo, and shared stages with the Indigo Girls, acted in the John Cameron Mitchell film *Shortbus*, co-wrote a song with Margaret Cho,

produced two albums of her elder folk hero Ferron, and licensed her music to The L Word. Eight years ago, she began to weave together *Bitchcraft*, her latest record.

The songs she wrote were a departure from anything she'd ever written before, and she began to craft huge pop tracks with the help of her trusty violin.

In the years that followed, Bitch assembled a coven to complete it. She called on Anne Preven (Beyonce, Madonna, Demi Lovato) and God-des who helped her crystalize her vision in terms of writing and production. She called on Roma Baran (Laurie Anderson) to produce the violins on *Polar Bear*. She called on Melissa York (Team Dresch, The Butchies) and Faith Soloway (Transparent) to co-write a couple of the songs.

The resulting record is one that is full of glorious pop tracks that go in unexpected directions. bitchmusic.com



Bonnie Morris, PhD is a women's history lecturer at the University of California-Berkeley and a nationally recognized expert on the role of women's music in lesbian culture. The author of sixteen books, she has devoted more than thirty years to documenting the women's music movement, first publishing Eden Built By Eves, a finalist for the Lambda Literary Award, and more recently, The Disappearing L and The Feminist Revolution. Her research

on women's music, Olivia Records, and American lesbian culture will one day be housed at the Radcliffe Institute's Schlesinger Library. In the past few years, Dr. Morris won a D.C. Arts and Humanities grant and a writing residency in Wales; organized the first-ever exhibit on the women's music movement at the Library of Congress; arranged for Olivia albums to be part of the Smithsonian; received the Ruth Rowan Believer Award from the National Women's Music Festival; and accepted the exciting role as Olivia Records' official historian and archivist. Dr. Morris has been a featured speaker at conferences and museums throughout the country and continues to profile women's music history for the Smithsonian. As a lesbian author, she also published the time travel novel Sappho's Bar and Grill for Bywater Books, which was a Finalist for the Foreword national award in LGBT fiction. In 2018, she won the Devil's Kitchen Award from Southern Illinois University. Bywater recently published the sequel, Sappho's Overhead Projector. Her latest book What's The Score, a history of women's sports, was released in 2022. bonniejmorris.com/



Cris Williamson

Decades before indie labels were the norm, and years before women had any real access to the industry, Cris Williamson was busy changing the face of popular music. In 1975, the twenty-something former schoolteacher recorded *The Changer And The Changed*, for her brainchild,

Olivia Records. the first woman-owned woman-focused record company. Her music and voice quickly became the soundtrack of a movement, and was the cornerstone of what would become known as "women's music," music created, performed, and marketed specifically to women. Today, that recording, *The Changer and the Changed*, remains one of the best-selling independent releases of

all time.

For Cris, the music became the vehicle for something larger. Her lyrics appear on a regular basis in books and thesis papers. Her albums are part of the curriculum for women's studies courses, and thousands of people who may not even know her name join their voices in "Song of the Soul" around campfires and places of worship. She is embraced by women. She is sampled in hip-hop, her music is used by midwives welcoming life into the world, while hospice choirs sing her songs in tender sacred escort.

Today, with 30+ full albums to her credit, Cris continues to tour the acoustic circuit adding new material at each juncture.

Robin Tyler is a pioneer within the grassroots movement of the LGBTI civil rights fight. She has played a seminal role in the struggle for equal right both in her current role as Executive Director of The Equality Campaign and as the first lesbian plaintiff to sue the state of California challenging the ban on same sex marriage. Robin & Diane were the only couple to receive a license in Los Angeles County on

Monday, June 16, 2008 the evening before licenses were available to the public at large. They were married that day surrounded by loved ones, friends and the media in front of the Beverly Hills Courthouse where they had previously been denied their license.

This lawsuit is not the first time Tyler has stood up to pave the way for equal rights. In the 1970's, Robin was the first openly-out of the closet gay or lesbian comic on stage, on national television, on records and in concerts, colleges and clubs. She has been called the 'mother' of gay comedy. In 1994 Robin Produced the first International Gay Comedy Festival which took place in Sydney, Australia, in conjunction with Sydney Gay Mardi-Gras. In 2002, Robin was featured in Paul Cain's book *Leading the Parade*, which included conversations with America's most influential lesbian and gay citizens.

In 2007, she revived *Always a Bridesmaid, Never a Groom*- her one-woman, award-winning comedy show about growing up a Jewish lesbian, and wanting to get married.

Additionally, Tyler has produced 25 major outdoor Women's Music & Comedy Festivals 1993 Marches on Washington for LGBT rights. robintyler.com

Her earliest memories of the piano were of climbing onto the piano bench and picking out the notes to tunes she heard either on the radio, record player or something the choir

sang at church. It became evident that Music had chosen Tammy to walk it's path. Giving full support for this journey were Tammy's two grandmothers, who pooled their resources to make sure she had access to private lessons from age 8 to 18. Tammy's grandfather also contributed to her musical journey by showing films of the greats Fats Waller, Dorothy Donegan, Hazel Scott, Duke Ellington and Count Basie; he was one of the first Black projectionists in the country and regularly showed films in his home and at public school auditoriums and churches for the community. These films along with the music she heard on the radio, at church, and the R&B, soul and pop records of the time, even the incidental and theme music she heard on television, all influenced Tammy's playing. These early experiences would form the triad of Tammy's core sound: a fusion of Jazz, Gospel and Classical. tammyhall.com

At NWMF she has conducted the world premieres of Kay Gardner's *Ouroboros* in 1994, Mary Watkins' *The Initiate* in 2016, and Cara Haxo's *Remember* in 2022.



Mary D. Watkins (composer) is the recipient of several granting foundations such as Meet The Composer, National Endowment for the Arts, Gerbode Foundation, Zellerbach Family Fund and California Council for the Arts. She is an eclectic composer. She is also a pianist, arranger, recording artist and

record producer. Much of her music reflects a love for many styles of music whether jazz, gospel, country, rock, classical or pop. She has composed solo piano for both adults and children, wind ensembles, Chamber and Full Symphony Orchestra. She has also composed for theater, dance and film; songs for solo vocalist, vocal ensemble and large chorus. She has written four operas, the most recent, *Emmett Till* with Clare Coss as librettist, premiered in New York in May of 2022. The opera, *Is This America*, the Fannie Lou Hamer Story will premiere in Boston in September 2024, commissioned by the White Snake Production Co.



Dawn Dongeun Wohn (Concert Maestra) - Praised as having "a joyful sense of freedom, and a pure, unencumbered tone" by BBC Music Magazine, Korean-American violinist Dawn Dongeun Wohn has performed in concert halls in North and South America, Asia, and Europe, including Carnegie Weill Hall, Lincoln Center, and the National Theater in Taiwan. As a soloist, she has performed with

orchestras such as the Korean Broadcasting Symphony and the Aspen Conducting Orchestra and has toured internationally as a

chamber musician.

Her debut album *Perspectives*, featuring diverse works by female composers, was featured by the New York Times, Spotify, and Apple Music and was chosen as one of WQXR's best albums of the year. Her recent release, *Unbounded* by Delos Music, explores music by American women. Both albums have been featured on radio programs all over the world and have been noted for their "enlightened advocacy" (Gramophone), "elegant and impassioned playing" (Fanfare), and "warm, crystal-clear tone" (Whole Note). Dawn was one of the last students of the famed pedagogue Dorothy DeLay, and pursued further studies at The Juilliard School, Yale University and Stony Brook University. Currently, she teaches at University of Wisconsin-Madison's Mead Witter School of Music and is the Artistic Director of the newly founded Coppia Concert Series.



Adina Shaikh (percussion & drum set) is an incoming senior pursuing a B.S. in Percussion Performance, Neurobiology, and Botany at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. She enjoys playing a diverse range of percussion, both in the classical Western canon and non-western diaspora. This includes Arabic and Persian drumming, Brazilian

samba batucada, tabla, orchestral percussion, and chamber music. 



2024 Women in the Arts/National Women's Music Festival, Inc Young Women of Color Composers Competition

Women in the Arts/National Women's Music Festival, Inc is pleased to announce the 2024 Young Women of Color Composers Competition for the creation of a new composition for orchestra to be premiered in July 2026 in celebration of the 50th National Women's Music Festival! T

Who should apply?

Emerging women composers of color, between the ages of 21 and 36 at the time of application. The composer must be available to attend the festival in July 2-5, 2026 at the Marriott Madison West Conference Center and Hotel in Middleton, WI. Composers, performers, or directors who have been paid or performed at NWMF during the past 5 years are not eligible to apply.

What will the Composer receive?

\$2,000 for composition and part extraction, Performance of the composition at the July 2026 NWMF, Archival video recording, travel, food and lodging for 2026 National Women's Music Festival

Composition Requirements:

The composition must be no longer than 7 minutes and no shorter than 5.5 minutes, scored for small orchestra. Style and content are open to composer's interpretation. All copyright laws apply to music.

Orchestra instrumentation: small orchestra or chamber orchestra (e.g., 2,1,2,1 – 2,2,1,0, strings no more than 2-part divisi and one double bass). Final instrumentation is to be discussed with NWMF Orchestra Music Director, Nan Washburn.

Percussion: 1-2 percussionists; availability of instruments to be discussed with NWMF Orchestra Music Director, Nan Washburn.

May include piano; however, no harpsichord or electronic keyboard,

To apply:

Submit a biographical sketch or vita, résumé of compositional activity, and at least two (2) sample works to nwmforch@gmail.com by December 31, 2024.

The sample works should be of 5-7-minute duration with digital audio in mp3, AAC, or WMA format and must include the score in PDF format. Samples must be ensemble compositions, from string quartet to full orchestra. YouTube or digital video links may be included; however, these will be excluded from samples evaluated by reviewers.

Review Process:

Reviews for preliminary and final selections will be anonymous. After receipt, the NWMF Orchestra Producer will identify submissions by number and make appropriate redactions for reviewers. Selections will be made based on the merits of work and suitability for performance at the National Women's Music Festival.

Timeline:

Call- June 1, 2024
Applications due - December 31, 2024
Selection of Finalists - April 1, 2025

Composer selection – **May 1, 2025**, with formal announcement at the 2025 NWMF

Music Director Consultation by May 15, 2025

Final Work (score and parts) completed – **November 15, 2025**


